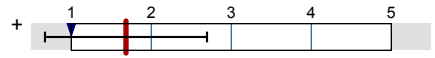

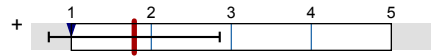

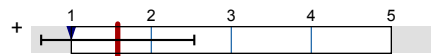

- A little more organization when presenting the materials
- A more efficient review before test.

- Can tend to get boring lacks interaction since it is a 3 hour course you can lose attention
- Do not grade solely on Quizzes and tests. People do not test very well and this can affect their grade. Provide a study guide or allow for open notes for a better outcome on test. Each testing date is filled with too much information to memorize which renders no aid.
- Don't base class on just test...some students have anxiety.Second be accurate with slides..a better study guidr to test...slides dont work

- Powerpoints are very helpful in teaching but it would be a good idea to have activities for students.
- Show markups on tests so students can know where their strenghts and weaknesses are. Powerpoint and lectures get boring-- more field trips!

- Structure the class around a discussion. The power points should be an aid but discussion is where we can really absorb the info.
- The class moves very quickly through the material, so slowing down when going over the lecture slides would help.
- The lectures could sometimes be "dry." Maybe include more breaks for discussion and rely less on the power point.
- The test questions should be covered after the test, so students can learn by their mistakes. This could be a great opportunity for class discussion and furthering knowledge, yet I have found that none of my professors went over the answers to test. the professor seemed to fluctuate back and fourth over materials which became confusing to me.
- There are only three tests in his class, no other assigned work so your grade is based on those three tests. A study guide would help a lot or assign some assignments so that there are more opportunities to getting a good grade in the class.
- There should be less of an emphasis on the use of powerpoint presentations, since students naturally focus copying down slides instead of understanding the core concepts behind the lecture.
- There should more assignments throughout the semester rather than only exams to base your grade off of.

Utilize your PowerPoints more and only put worthwhile information on slides (I.E. info for tests and for discussion) It was nearly impossible to learn when I was too busy writing notes and guessing what would be needed for tests that we wouldn't be taking for weeks later.
- Upload the class lecture powerpoints more timely, so that the students can have more time to review.
- When taking lecture notes I would appreciate it and I'm sure other students would too - if he would give us enough time to write down the notes off the power points.
